The Pollination of Flowers

Start typing your introductory paragraph. Your paper should look something like this. If not, seek the help from your teacher or a parent. Remember, a good paragraph consists of at least five to seven sentences. When you are finished with your introductory paragraph, you will push the enter key and then tab over once to start your second paragraph. Do not forget to use periods at the ends of your sentences. Here is where you put your thesis statement.

Your first body paragraph will be next, and the first sentence needs to state the topic of this paragraph. Do not forget to make sure your margins on all sides are set at 1.5 inches for the left side and 1 inch for right side. In your paper, you will need to have citations. There are two ways to type a citation in your paper. For citations that are less than forty words, you will type as normal, and then you will end your sentence like this (Strate 105). In the parenthesis, you put the author's last name and the page number where you got your information. If there is no author, put the title of the article in place of the author's name. For quotes that are longer than forty words, you will need to follow this pattern

Here is where your quote that is more than forty words will go. The author had a lot to say on his subject. I thought it was imperative

to type exactly what he said in the book. The margins for this quote are set a half inch in on the left and right of the whole quote. As I finish with all the information, I will need the quote like so (Strate 1992).

Now you keep typing your rest of the paragraph. The spacing goes back to double spacing.

Now you will resume typing the rest of your paper. This is your second body paragraph, and don't forget to make your first sentence state the topic discussed here. Hopefully, by this illustration you will be able to see how both citations look when typed.

This is where your third body paragraph will begin. Don't forget the topic sentence! If there are any questions regarding how your paper will be typed, please ask your teacher. Enjoy learning about your subject.

This is where your conclusion goes. Sum up your research, offer suggestions, and don't forget to re-state your thesis statement.
